## I. Basic Information

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# **Course Description**

Political ideologies permeate all aspects of contemporary existence. There is no escaping the effect they have on everything from domestic and international policy, social and political organization, and the experience of everyday life. In this course you will learn about various political ideologies and belief systems—from left to right, and everything in between. Political ideologies often emerge out of a specific historical context in response to what is perceived as a political problem or threat. How an ideology or adherents frame the political problem will have a strong effect on their proposed solution/s. Furthermore, how an ideology proposes to solve political problems will determine how proponents understand the role of the state; who is responsible for the problem, and who is the intended beneficiary of the solution; as well as the role of justice/the justice system, political change, and the economy. Through reading, writing, thinking, and in-class discussions, you will learn how each political ideology conceptualizes each of these elements, as well as what constitutes their ideal political project. Beyond exposing you to ideologies across the political spectrum, this course will encourage you to critically examine your own political ideology and reflect on this in comparison with other ideologies. While the purpose of this course is not to change your mind, this course is an opportunity to think through your ideological commitments while experimenting with others. There may be no escape from ideological commitments, but they are subject to change.
